SUMMER YOUTH IN IKARIA

Once again this year, we will be participating in the Hellenic Society "Padeia" summer college program. The course is sponsored through the University of Connecticut, and is a three credit course that will be given in Ikaria the first three weeks of July, 2005. This year, the application and instructions are online. I am enclosing the information on the program that was published in the winter edition of Ikaria magazine with this message to all of our chapters and encourage our youth to take advantage of this program. The class is titled "The Language and Culture of Greece". A course itinerary has also been included with the application. Applications should be sent in as soon as possible as the class is filling up fast. At the Chicago Convention the delegates voted for the

FOUNDATION

Scholarship applications have been published in the magazine. Some of the scholarships are merit based and others are need based. The Foundation also has budgeted merit based graduate scholarships as well as scholarships for students in Greece. Scholarship applications, printed in the winter edition of Ikaria Magazine, must be completed and postmarked by the end of June 2005.

MINUTES OF THE SUPREME LODGE MEETING

SATURDAY, JANUARY 22, 2005 CLEARWATER, FLORIDA

The second meeting of the Supreme Lodge was held on January 22, 2005 at the Clearwater Chapter Helios Clubhouse, and hosted by Helios Chapter 19. Prior to the meeting, the Supreme Lodge officers met with PSP Dr. Stanton Tripodis and chapter member Gus Tsambis and traveled to St. Petersburg to tour the Vinoy Hotel, site of the 2006 convention. The Supreme Lodge met with hotel representatives at 10:00 a.m. and toured the resort's premises.

At the same time, the Foundation officers held a meeting at the Chapter Helios Clubhouse.

Afterwards, the Supreme Lodge traveled back to the Chapter Helios clubhouse in Dunedin, Florida where the Helios Chapter members, the Supreme Lodge, Foundation officers, and members visiting from other chapters were treated to a wonderful luncheon by the host chapter.

The meeting started at 1:45 p.m. The opening prayer was rendered prior to the luncheon by PSP and former Foundation Chief Gus Stefanadis. Opening remarks were delivered by our immediate PSP Dr. Stanton Tripodis.

A roll call of Supreme Lodge officers followed and included Supreme Lodge President George Horiates, Vice President Nicholas Tsalis, Secretary Mike Aivaliotis, Treasurer Sonja Stefanadis, Counselor George Koklanaris, District Governor #1 Nikolaos Pasamihalis, District Governor #4, Kiki Tratras, District Governor #5 PSP George Achedafty, District Governor #6 Zacharias Lefas. Also present was Foundation Chair Anthony Kayafas, Vice Chair Socrates Koutsoutis, Director Chris Aivaliotis and Director Gus Yiakas.

Also recognized at the beginning of the meeting were Ikaria Magazine editor Niki Plutis, PSP Gus Stefanadis, PSP Dr. Stanton Tripodis, PSP Petros Tsantes, PSP Nick Batouyios, PSP John Sakoutis, former foundation director Nick Tratras, former District Governor George A. Horiates, Cleveland Chapter 3 President Maria Tripodis, former Krikos and Port Jefferson President George Kesses and former Supreme Lodge Counselor John Papandreas.

The agenda for the Supreme Lodge meeting, the minutes of the First Supreme Lodge meeting held in Cleveland in the fall, the winter President's message, the Youth Committee's Conference proposal, as well as AFGLC and Cleisthenes informational flyers were distributed to all of the members present to review. The agenda was approved unanimously. The minutes as presented were also approved by the lodge.

COMMUNICATIONS

A letter was received from George Antoniadis of Ikaria, regarding the status of the Souroumanis estate and the Old Age Home. A report on the status of these matters is more fully set forth herein.

Discussion ensued on communications to lodge chapter officers from a Mike Lardas from a group calling themselves "IPOA." After the discussion, the counselor was directed by the Supreme Lodge to send a letter stating this group is not an affiliate of the Pan Icarian Brotherhood and asks to cease it's misrepresenting to our members.

The American Foundation for Greek Language and Culture sent a letter inviting the Pan Icarian Brotherhood to it's annual educational forum to be held on the Tampa campus of the University of South Florida from March 3-5, 2005.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Supreme Lodge Treasurer Sonja Stafanadis reported the current balance in the checking amount at \$46,951.01. The Supreme Lodge Certificate of Deposit has a value of \$50,626.45

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Membership

Vice President Nick Tsalis reported that he is in the process of ordering plaques for the 3 chapters that had the highest percentage increase last year.

We will be contacting all of the chapters as we start the 2005 membership campaign. Our goal is to exceed last year's membership of 2,113 by 10%. We will continue to recognize chapters with the greatest percentage increase in this size category. The three categories are 1) up to 50 members, 2) 51 to 100 members and 3) 101 members and higher.

Supreme Lodge Treasurer Sonja Stefanadis stated she had received a response from an Icarian not living near any of our current chapters. This request to join the Pan Icarian Brotherhood was as a result of a new page on the website designed to reach out to all Icarians in North America not living near any chapter.

We also found at least 3 Icarians in the Boston area. We will be putting an advertisement in the local Greek newspaper in the Boston area to see if there are other Icarians in the are interested in creating a chapter in Beantown.

Other ideas brought forth from our Cleveland Supreme Lodge meeting that the Supreme Lodge wants to emphasize is to sign up members as soon as they are 18 years of age, maintain a student rate of only the per capita of \$15.00 and to encourage spouses to also become members.

Youth Committee

The proposal for the fist ever Icarian Youth Leadership Conference was reviewed. The idea was brought forth at the Chicago convention and is supported by the Supreme Lodge. The site of the conference is Pittsburgh and it is set for Memorial Day weekend to coincide with Chapter Icaros' mini-convention festivities.

The purpose of the conference is to provide an open forum for our youth, to have them meet youth from other chapters, encourage their participation and foster greater communication between the youth and the Pan Icarian Brotherhood as well as to encourage socialization with other Icarians.

The ages for this event are youth 18 to 30 years old. They must be members in good standing in any chapter of the Pan Icarian Brotherhood. The proposal also stated there is no limit as to how many members attend from any one chapter, although it is asked that each chapter sent at least one youth member to attend.

Basically, all youth members wishing to participate would need to only pay for their transportation to and from Pittsburgh. Lodging accommodations would be at the Comfort Inn in Harmerville, PA, which is where visiting Icarians stay during the mini convention weekend. All hotel and food costs would be paid for by the Supreme Lodge as well as the cost for the Sunday night dance.

The youth will be directed by a flyer posted on the website, printed in the magazine and to be sent to each chapter. The flyer will direct them not to contact the hotel directly but to contract President Horiates or youth committee chair Stephanie Sakoutis to make reservations. The rooms at the Comfort Inn have 2 beds in each room so we will be matching up youth in pairs. Of course, young women will be matched separately from the men.

The itinerary includes registration starting on Saturday, May 28, 2005 at 8:00 a.m. Continental breakfast will be served and business sessions will start at 10:00 a.m. Supreme Lodge officers will introduce themselves but the youth participating will be meeting to discuss any issues to bring forth at the Myrtle Beach convention. Saturday will also include dinner at the Chapter Icaros club house, although that will be based on availability in conjunction with the golf tournament.

On Sunday, the youth will tour the Pan Icarian Archives, conclude their meetings and attend the miniconvention Memorial Day dance. There will also be free time as there is a pool at the hotel and various other activities planned. The estimated cost, including the room cost, lunch, dinner and expenses for registration with workbooks is anticipated to be no more than \$4,000.

After some discussion, the Supreme Lodge unanimously supported the project. Although the Spring Supreme Lodge meeting will be in Los Angeles in April, it is requested the lodge officers also attend the miniconvention and help with any assistance the youth committee may need.

Chicago Convention

Chapter Foutrides provided a detailed statement of income and expenses. Foundation Chair Anthony Kayafas reported he received a check in the amount of \$15,623.76 representing 50% of the proceeds from the chapters. President Horiates thanked the chapter once again for its efforts and for providing the financial statement.

Myrtle Beach Convention

Plans are moving ahead. President Horiates met with the convention committee in November, 2004. The first mailing was en route, already mailed and should be arriving at each member's residence shortly. Also, there is an internet link from our website to the convention site.

Chapter Therma asked for assistance regarding the Youth Banquet. It was moved and accepted to subsidize the youth banquet at \$15 per attendee with a maximum of \$1,500.000 from the Supreme Lodge.

Discussions were again held concerning delaying or suspending the Saturday morning business meetings so that they would not interfere with a planned golf outing. Many at the meeting were again concerned that the business might be taking a back seat to the festivities,

interfering with the convention business. A point of order was made that the only body able to suspend or delay the business meeting is the 2005 convention delegate body.

Clearwater Convention

As previously started, the Supreme Lodge toured the Vinoy resort earlier in the day. The facility and amenities at the Vinoy are top rate. We toured the Vinoy banquet rooms, meeting spaces, and hotel rooms. We also toured the large poor area, dining facilities, garden areas in this impressive resort located at the heart of downtown St. Petersburg, FL.

As to the \$109 room rate, discussion ensued that the convention bid was given by the chapter at \$99.00. It was explained that the bid sheet used by the chapter was from the previous year's convention bid and that the rate was unwittingly brought forth to the floor. PSP Stanton Tripodis assured that the chapter was successful in obtaining certain accommodations from the hotel to offset this miscommunication.

Thereafter, President Horiates asked that if anyone objected to the \$109 rate. He had first noted the issue in the Cleveland Supreme Lodge meeting minutes, which were disturbed to each chapter president and stated the Supreme Lodge's intent to address this issue at this meeting. In that there were no objections by any member prior to or at this meeting, while considering the facility as well as the host chapter's obtaining concessions, the lodge approved the contract for the 2006 convention.

Cleisthenes Project

President Horiates again presented the miniature bust of Cleisthenes and distributed hand-outs regarding the project. He is hopeful that chapters and individual donors will step up and forward donations to the foundation for this course. He continues to bring the bust and Cleisthenes material with him to each chapter he visits.

Traveling Archives Exhibit

The President could not bring the exhibit with him to Florida because of risk of damage from the snowstorm back in Philadelphia. The first showing of the exhibit in Cleveland was well received.

Senior Citizen's Report

The Souroumanis estate matter is close to finalization. Although there have been many letters written regarding distribution to the Old Age Home in Ikaria, it is noted that the foundation has not yet received the monies. It is anticipated that the agreement regarding the particles of management and disbursement of these funds will be addressed in the upcoming months. The executors wish that a second story addition be added and that the monies be earmarked for that purpose.

If this is the case, numerous legal issues need to be addressed as to how monies will be transferred to Ikaria, who will be signatories to the account as well as other complexities that must be addressed before the Foundation receives the monies.

Only when the Court receives and approves the final agreement will we be in a position to receive the monies from the Souroumanis estate. Further updates will be provided as we go through this process.

George Kesses was recognized and provided his remarks urging a cautious approach once the monies are received.

Historian/Records

District Governor PSP George Achedafty presented a detailed report on the transcribing of Supreme Lodge and convention meeting minutes written in Greek over the course of our existence. With the assistance of translators, most of the minutes in our possession and warehoused at our archives in Pittsburgh have been translated. He will be putting forth a request in Ikaria Magazine to ask the members for their assistance if they have minutes in Greek or English for certain years.

Hellenic Culture

At this time, President Horiates introduced Dr. Chris Tsokos, Ph.D., Dr. John Hatsios, PH.D. and Dr. Demetrius Halkias, Ph.D. The guests are members of the South Florida branch of the American Federation of Greek Language and Culture, noted as AFGLC. AFGLC is an organization chartered to promote Hellenic studies in many of the major universities in the United States.

A 501c3 Foundation the goal is to endow or augment existing professorships in varied Greek Studies. Through the help of organizations such as ours and the AFGLC's efforts in negotiating matching funds from the University, a five course program of studies will be endowed in perpetuity. To protect the initial investment of a minimum of \$500,000.00 the university and the AFGLC will contract together by legal document to achieve the desired goal. The study center will be overseen by a board consisting of members from the University, the AFGLC and the monetary donor. Many questions were asked by the members present. The guests provided various handouts and fielded all questions. The Lodge requested sample contracts of established programs. All present thanked the representatives of the AFGLC for attending and considering our Organization as a possible partner.

Once contracts are reviewed further investigation into this project will continue. Sonja Stefanadis will attend the AFGLC's winter meetings as a representative of the Brotherhood and will provide a report at the next meeting.

Counselor's Report

Counselor Koklanaris met with the Clearwater chapter at the hotel site this past fall. A recommendation was made regarding insurance policies for liability and loss of profits in case of disruption to the festivities due to weather.

Governor's Report

District Governor 1 Nikolaos Pasamihalis reported that he attended Baltimore's Christmas Party, where he helped preside over elections. He also met last week with New York - Pandiki's President. Chapter Atheras has it's Super Bowl party in two weeks. Mr. Pasamihalis will be visiting Port Jefferson and Pandiki in the upcoming months.

District Governor 2 Emanuel Lardas was not present but submitted a written report. He has been in touch with all of his chapters and is rooting for a Steelers victory.

District 4 Kiki Tratras reported on Therma's planning for the upcoming convention, Atlanta had its annual breakfast with Santa Claus, Houston hosted a bake sale and Christmas Party. She also is looking forward to the Chapter Helios dance scheduled for tonight.

District Governor 6 Zacharias Lefas extended his greetings from his Chapter, Montreal. He told us of their involvement in the local Greek community. He also plans on visiting the Toronto Chapter. Mr. Lefas thanked the members for a productive meeting and looks forwards to the continued involvement of his chapters in the Brotherhood.

District Governor 5 PSP George Achedafty noted that Los Angeles would be hosting the next Supreme Lodge meeting during Chapter's "Day at the Races" in April, 2005. He also plans on visiting San Francisco in 2 weeks as they are hosting their annual dance.

Foundation Report

Foundation Chair Anthony Kayafas reported that the Foundation had a meeting earlier today to discuss scholarships and the Souroumanis estate. Scholarship applications will be sent out in the upcoming Ikaria Magazine.

President's Report

President Horiates thanked the members of Chapter Helios for hosting the Supreme Lodge meeting. In particular, he thanked PSP Dr. Stanton Tripodis for his efforts.

He spoke briefly on membership, the need to support

the Cleisthenes project, and is looking forward to the Youth Conference on Memorial Day weekend.

He noted for the record that Ikaria Magazine editor Niki Plutis was here earlier in the meeting, that she took the time to render a report and that she took various photographs throughout the meeting.

The next Supreme Lodge meeting will be on April 2, 2005 in Los Angeles, CA. Further information will be provided to our chapters in the mail. He asked that Supreme Lodge officers also attend Pittsburgh's miniconvention weekend and support the Youth Conference to be held at that time.

A memory of silence was observed for all recently passed members.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 5:15p.m.

<u>Postnote</u>: After the meeting, the Chapter hosted it's annual dinner dance which was well attended. The Supreme Lodge thanks Chapter Helios for it's hospitality and looks forward to the 2006 convention.

Vice President Nick Tsalis reported on the 2005 membership campaign. Our goal is to exceed last year's membership of 2,145 by 10%. We will continue to recognize chapters with the greatest percentage increase in this size category. The three categories are 1) up to 50 members, 2) 51 to 100 members and 3) 101 members and higher.

Youth Committee

Plans are progressing for the first even Icarian Youth leadership conference. From the Pittsburgh site, Michelle

Kotsagrelos has volunteered to assist. Again, all chapters are asked to send a least one representative. Also, Supreme Lodge Officers are asked to attend and participate.



Weston's Journal of his first trip to Ikaria

Growing up as a child in Wilmington, I never thought about going anywhere else. I loved it here. In the summer of 1996 though, my family took a trip to Greece for a vacation. We picked Greece for a number of reasons, but mainly because my dad's entire family is from there, yet we had never been there.

While we were there, I realized something about myself that would forever shape me into who I was to become. It was this trip, when I was only 10 years old, that I realized that one of my biggest passions in life was traveling. When we arrived in Athens, I was



astonished. I had never dreamed that there could be a city so much bigger and different than our own tiny town in southeastern North Carolina. As we hiked up a mountain in the center of Athens, even at ten years old, I could truly appreciate the massive foundation of the ancient Acropolis that sat so high above the city. After spending a few days in the city, I thought it couldn't get any better. Then we took a ferry to the tiny island of Ikaria, where my family was from. When I arrived at Ikaria, I thought to myself, "We should have come here sooner." I was absolutely amazed. I had never seen mountains so high plummet straight into the water that was a deeper shade of blue than I had ever known. Life there was so different and instead of wondering why, I soaked it up, enjoyed every minute. While living on the island for almost three weeks, I gained a deep respect for the culture of Greece—the music, the food, and the way of life.

There I am in the center of the picture, without a care in the world, because I am so far from home, but I was so comfortable there that it felt like I had lived there my entire life. This picture accurately captures a turning point in my life. It was a defining moment in my life because it opened my eyes to so many new things that I had never even thought of experiencing. It didn't just open my eyes to Greece either. From that point onward, I became obsessed with seeing new places and meeting new people that were different from anything I had ever known. Here I was, ten years old, and I was already creating memories and stories that I will have with me forever. It turns out that this trip to Greece would be just the beginning of an entire lifetime filled with exciting stories from far away places. I will always remember though, that it was the tiny island of Ikaria that sparked within me this enormous passion which I will carry for the rest of my life.

THE VISUAL POLITICS OF STEPHAN PASTIS

It doesn't seem to have occurred to anyone that Greeks in America are among the leading political cartoonists of our times. Yet the evidence is all there for the watchful reader

Consider the careers and cartoons of Irene Peslikis, Paul Mavrides and, most recently, the international sensation caused by Gregg and Evan Spiridellis and their flash animation on the Internet dealing with the upcoming presidential election (www.jibjab.com).

That Stephan T. Pastis fits into this radical comedy collective will probably surprise him more than anyone else.


Stephan Pastis was born in 1968 and raised in San Marino, California, a suburb of Los Angeles. He graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1989 with a

degree in political science. Although he had always wanted to be a syndicated cartoonist, Pastis realized that the odds of syndication were slim. So

In 1997, Pastis came up with the cartoon strip, Pearls Before Swine, which he submitted to the syndicates in mid-1999. In December 1999, he signed a contract with United Feature Syndicate. Rather than run this strip in newspapers, UFS made the then-innovative move of debuting Pearls Before Swine on the Internet. Pearls Before Swine made its triumphant appearance into daily newspapers in January 2002.

Pearls Before Swine now appears in some 150 newspapers worldwide, including the Washington Post, Philadelphia Inquirer, Atlanta Journal Constitution, Chicago Sun Times and Houston Chronicle, and online at www.comics.com, where it had already found a loyal audience. Not unexpectedly, Stephan Pastis left his law practice in August 2002.

"At its heart, Pearls Before Swine is the comic strip tale of two friends: a megalomaniacal rat, who thinks he knows it all, and a dimwitted Pig, who doesn't know any

better. Together, this pair offers caustic commentary on humanity's quest for the unattainable. The title of the strip comes from the New Testament, and is taken from the phrase, 'Do not cast

your pearls before swine.' In this case, Rat believes he is an endless source of wisdom, and that his wisdom is wasted upon Pig, who is rather slow. In truth, neither of them is very smart, but while Pig is content with his humble status in life, Rat is always on a futile search for fame, riches and immortality," Patsis said.

Pastis practiced law in the Bay area from 1993 to 2002. In time, became an attorney at the law firm of Thornton Taylor Downs

in 1990, he entered UCLA and graduated with his law

degree in 1993. While in law school, Pastis created the

Becker, Tolson & Doherty in San Francisco. He is married and lives with his wife Staci and their two children in Santa Rosa, California. While litigating,
