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

Youth Leadership—Thanks to Maria Tripodis and Pharos Chapter for hosting the Youth Leadership Conference in March. Hopefully more chapters will be represented in Cleveland. The goal is not only to have a social success but to have the attendees learn more of our Brotherhood; proper procedures and to return home with enthusiasm to share with their chapter officers and members.

ITEMS DISCUSSED:

- · Welcome: President Mike Aivaliotis opened with welcoming remarks thanking the Lychnos Chapter for hosting the Supreme Lodge and especially the Kratsas family for opening their home to the Lodge. He thanked Chapter President Lavender Kratsas and her husband Zack for their efforts in preparing for the weekend's events. The meeting was held in their beautiful backyard, a true Icarian aylh.
- **Introductions:** The members of the Supreme Lodge each introduced themselves to the Chapter.
- · **Meeting Minutes**: Minutes of the last Supreme Lodge meeting in Detroit, MI were distributed, accepted and approved.
- **Treasurer's Report:** Supreme Treasurer George Koklanaris gave the Treasurer's Report. As of February, the ending balance of the PNC Checking Account was \$43,913.12.

Two Certificates of Deposit have been opened: \$35,000 with National City Bank \$15,000 with Laselle Bank

The Treasurer stated that the 2008 tax information had been submitted to the Brotherhood's accountant, Mr. Ferra, who will be filing for an extension.

Membership Total:

The Treasurer noted that some dues had been collect for the 2009 season including the Foutrides, Aivaliotis and Pharos Chapters. Overall, however, the membership total is 1,858 persons - near the 2007 total.

Discussion regarding the membership fall-off ensued. Foundation Vice-Chair Gus Yiakas suggested that the Chapters send reminder notices to their members.

· Vice-President Report: Supreme Vice-President Sonja Stefanadis addressed the meeting. She too thanked the Kratsas family and the Chapter for welcoming the Lodge. Vice-President Stefanadis introduced a letter regarding a class action lawsuit for those like the Lodge who had had a Sun Trust CD. Settlement options would offer a future Sun Trust CD with a starting amount of \$354.17 or an alternative cash payment of \$230.21. As a court decision is pending, more information will be forthcoming.

Sonja stressed the need to contact lost members as well as students in efforts to bolster the Pan-Icarian membership. She offered that even scholarship recipients could receive a membership application with their award letter.

The Vice-President related that she had talked with the new Norfolk, VA Chapter – Erini No. 28 and its President Mosca Nichols

· District Governors' Reports:

District 1 - Governor George Paralemos could not attend the weekend as his wife was christening a child.

District 2 - Governor Marino Moraitis attended the V.I. Chebithes Chapter membership drive at a local country club – 40 members attended. He noted that Argie Spithas was re-elected Chapter President.

The Vice-Chairman reported that we should all be proud of our support for Konstantinos Tsantiris who had his liver transplant and is doing well in England.

The Vice-Chairman said the Pan-Icarian Foundation would struggle to uphold its recent track of scholarship awards given the current market conditions. He encouraged eligible students to still make the application. The membership of the Brotherhood has stepped forward before to satisfy all the scholarship applications.

The Vice-Chairman recommended that each Chapter appoint a member to champion the local fundraising efforts for the Pan-Icarian Foundation. He cited the example of District Gov Facaros who convinced his friend that presenting a \$30,000 donation to the Foundation would be a worthy cause.

<u>New Business</u> The President congratulated Stavros Koutis and Rose Pamphilis on their centennial birthday celebrations.

Good of the Order District 5 Governor Steve Facaros warmly thanked the Gasparinatos family of Chapter Atheras which aided him and his wife during his brief hospital stay immediately at the close of the Philadelphia Convention.

- · Welcome: President Mike Aivaliotis opened with welcoming remarks thanking Chapter Pres. Michelle Kotsagrelos and the Icaros Chapter for hosting the Supreme Lodge. He especially thanked Icaros members Maggie Mamatas and Joanne Melacrinos for preparing a delicious luncheon and desserts including a truly wonderful bundt cake. The meeting was held in the Icaros Chapter Hall, home of the Pan-Icarian Archives.
- **Introductions:** The members of the Supreme Lodge each introduced themselves to the Chapter.
- · **Meeting Minutes**: Minutes of the last Supreme Lodge meeting in San Francisco, CA were distributed, accepted and approved.
- Treasurer's Report: Supreme Treasurer George Koklanaris could not attend the weekend but submitted the Treasurer's Report via email. Supreme Vice-President Sonja Stefanadis read the report to the attendees -

"Our current balance is \$34,311.02 This figure does not reflect the funds recently forwarded to Brother Mike for deposit; an additional \$3,915.00 received from various chapters for 09 dues. Our 2 CD's represent an additional \$50,000 in savings. Our largest expenditure for this month will be the \$6,000 sent to the magazine for the Summer issue. Please pass the word on to the chapters to forward their dues to me in a relatively timely manner."

Membership Total:

"To date we have received 2009 Per Capita for 462 members. The breakout is as follows: Pittsburgh 97, Akron 66,

Cleveland 71, Los Angeles 17, Clearwater 143, Columbus 26, Chicago 41, and Houston 1."

An additional 29 members for 2008 was received, raising the 2008 membership total to 1881 members.

Database:

The attendees discussed the feasibility of allowing Chapters access to the Database to do local address updates and membership postings. The Treasurer/Database Manager would in turn validate the entries once the per capita has been received. The Lodge will review with the Pan-Icarian Website manager to see if this could be possible through the site.

· Correspondence: The Lodge received an email from Manolis Galenianos and Alexander Stafanadis from Heraklion, Crete. They are developing an on-line bibliography of Greek materials for Greeks in the Diaspora. They were looking for assistance and suggestions on the list. The Lodge will reply that they believe the idea has merit and wish them good luck.

President Aivaliotis received an invitation from the Atlanta Philoptochos for a Children's Medical Fund Luncheon schedule for November. He forwarded the info to Sonja.

· Vice-President Report: Supreme Vice-President Sonja Stefanadis addressed the meeting.

She gave kudos to Icaros Chapter Pres. Michelle Kotsagrelos and Chapter Tres. Cathy Pandeladis for their thorough management of the Icaros membership and work for the Youth Conference in Cleveland.

EXPLORING IKARIAN LONGEVITY

How to outlive your doctor By Dan Buettner CNN.com Tuesday, April 21, 2009

Ikaria, GREECE — In 1970, when doctors diagnosed Greek-American Yiannis Karimalis with stomach cancer and only gave him a few months to live, he decided to move back to Ikaria, his birth island. There, he reasoned, he could be buried more inexpensively among his fellow Greeks.

But when he moved back to the island he didn't die. He has lived nearly 40 years more. And when he returned to America on a recent visit, he discovered that his doctors were all dead. The people on this 99square-mile Greek island in the eastern Aegean Sea smugly tell this story as yet another example of what they've always known and scientists are now discovering: People in Ikaria live longer than in just about another other place in the world. A recent study of 90year-old siblings, conducted by the National Hellenic Research Foundation, discovered 10 times more 90-year-old brothers and sisters here than the European average.

Why is this important?

Most scientists agree that the average human should live to age 90. (You have to have won the genetic lottery to live to 100.) But the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says life expectancy in America is 78. Somewhere along the line, we're losing about a dozen years — most of them to costly and potentially preventable chronic diseases such as heart attacks, diabetes and cancer. These diseases are dragging down our health care system and account for much of the reason why the National Institute on Aging says the average American suffers about three disabled end-of-life years during which they incur 90 percent of our lifelong health care costs.

Ikarians are avoiding these diseases and reaching age 90 at a rate of about four times the rate that Americans do. They are getting the good years we're missing, dying

quickly and less expensively.

For the next two weeks, I'm leading "The Blue Zones" expedition, an AARP and National Geographic sponsored team of the world's best demographers, physicians, medical researchers and media specialists, to explore Ikarian longevity.

We already have a few clues. Since at least the sixth century B.C., Icaria was known to the ancient Greeks and Romans as a health destination — largely for its hot

> springs believed to relieve pain, joint problems and skin ailments. Our team has reviewed reports of high levels of radon in these baths and will be exploring a theory that chronic exposure to help protect DNA against the ravages of

> low-level radiation may aging. For much of the ensu-

> ing two millenniums, people here lived in relative isolation. The people here evolved a unique diet that we believe is a more heartprotective version of the Mediterranean diet. We're doing pharmacological analyses of dozens of herbal teas and unique honey

produced by bees that draw pollen of thyme, fir and erica. We think we'll find anti-cancer, anti-oxidant and probiotic properties in these locally produced products. We also know that people here have a vastly different character than the rest of the Mediterranean. They have volcanic tempers that quickly subside. Despite living on harsh, steep terrain, they're known for relentless optimism and three-day parties. They don't get stressed by deadlines. They go to bed well after midnight, sleep late and take naps. Anecdotally, we know that most people over 90 are sexually active.

Do these people possess the true secret to longevity? We're not sure yet, but we'll certainly distill a few clues about living longer, better. Ikarian wisdom may not help you live to 100. But at least they may help you outlive www.bluezones.com/ikaria your doctor.

The Blue Zones team determined the top 8 factors of longevity in Ikaria are:

- 1. Wild Greens Greens are abundant in fields and roadsides. Ikarians frequently eat wild green salads and pies. Some contain more antioxidants than green tea or wine.
- 2. Herbal Teas The common herbal teas consumed here contain compounds that lower blood pressure and decrease the risk of heart disease and dementia.
- 3. Low sense of time urgency Feeling less obligation to one's schedule and day is shown to lower heart-harming stress hormones.
- 4. Daily naps Taking a 30-minute nap at least five times a week can decrease the risk of heart attack by 35 percent.
- 5. Mountain living Here, every trip out of the house occasions a mini workout. People get their daily exercise without thinking about it. Studies show the mountain people have lower cardio vascular disease.
- 6. Strong sense of community Family and village support create strong social connections, which are proven to promote longevity.
- 7. Goat's milk 80 percent of all people over 90 have consumed goat's milk many times per week throughout their life. It is rich in blood-pressure lowering tryptophan and antibacterial compounds.
- 8. Ikarian diet The Ikarian variation of Mediterranean Diet is high in vegetables, beans, and low in meat and sugar. Uniquely, though, it's lower in grains and fish, but high in potatoes.

The Blue Zones: What do our members think?

Ikaria Magazine asked:

Unless you've been under a rock for the past few weeks, you've heard about Ikaria being named a "blue zone". Much publicity has been centered around our island with crews filming there daily and posting reports on their website as well as on news shows like CNN 360, Good Morning America and Nightline. Many facts have been given about why it is that so many Ikarians live so long — diet, social activity, purpose of life, naps and even frequency of sex. So - the question to you is, what do you think of all this?

Is all of this publicity around Ikaria positive or could it be seen as negative? Do we really want our island broad-casted nationally and internationally for all to see? Can Ikaria survive an influx of people who may want to relocate or retire to a famed blue zone? Are the findings of the blue zones crew valid in your opinion or are these facts that most Mediterranean people already know?

To The Editor:

Any news is good news! I believe the coverage has been fair and positive for the most part. Ikaria for too long has been seen as a second rate island. We lack the infrastructure and amenities that the 21-century demands. Maybe all this coverage will finally force the Greek Government to invest on infrastructure and motivate the local Ikarians to focus on the enhancement of the island. Even if there is a huge influx of people in the coming years it will be very short lived. Unfortunately, Ikaria lacks proper ports, ferry and air service (except during the summer months), roads, water, electricity, sewers and most importantly medical facilities. These factors are essential to sustain an increase in population. Therefore, people might come to explore but will not anchor themselves to the island. In closing, if there is one thing we should take from all of this (especially the youth of Ikaria), is that we need to revert to the diet and physical and social activities of the elders. Today, most youth seldom exercise, eat greasy and fried food and consume a large amount of tobacco and alcohol. If the new generation does not change their ways and the "Blue Zone" group were to go back to Ikaria in 20 - 30 years, they would be very shocked to discover just the opposite of their initial findings! Keeping up with U.S. Rep. Zack Space

Ohio rep helped prevent hasty vote on 'stimulus' An Editorial originally published February 19, 2009

While we disagree with U.S. Rep. Zack Space's vote in favor of the so-called "stimulus" bill, he is to be applauded for one stand he took in regard to the measure.

Space, who represents the 18th District in East Ohio, was one of just 18 Democrats in the House of Representatives to break with his party in regard to an important issue.

Several "procedural" votes were taken in the House on Friday, before the main event - HR1, the \$787 billion "stimulus" bill - could come to a vote. One of the preliminary votes involved questions about how quickly a bill can be voted on, once its final version is posted.

Clearly, that is an important issue. Too often, members of Congress vote on bills they have not had time to understand adequately. According to one published report, Democrat leaders in the House had agreed to a provision requiring that no bill could be brought to a floor vote unless at least 48 hours had passed since the text was posted.

So powerful were the forces in favor of the "stimulus" bill that a vote on it was requested within just a few hours of it being posted. Clearly, most representatives didn't have time to go through the text in order to understand the "stimulus" bill's provisions. Because the required 48 hours had not passed, a procedural vote had to be taken to clear the way for the bill to go to the House floor.

"Stimulus" bill promoters won that vote, 234-194. But every Republican in the House voted "nay" - and Space joined them. Again, he was one of just 18 Democrats to do that.

Obviously, Space agreed with critics of the rush to passage that House Democrat leaders were being unfair in ramming the bill forward without allowing enough time for it to be understood. During coming months, liberals who control the House no doubt will attempt to push more legislation forward without allowing it to be subjected to proper scrutiny. We hope Space continues to oppose such tactics, for the good of his constituents. Transparency in the legislative process should not be a question of partisan politics.

In the end, Space joined his fellow Democrats in voting for the "stimulus" bill. But he displayed some political courage in his stance on procedure - and for that, he deserves to be commended.



Dennis Mantas of Arvada, Colorado was born in Chicago on November 28, 1940 and was raised in East

Wheat Ridge Pharmacist Loved Community

Dennis Mantas, who survived three armed robberies and dozens of break-ins at his Wheat Ridge Pharmacy, died in a fire at his home April 23.

Mantas, who was 68, was overcome by smoke as he tried to escape.

His wife, Maria Mantas, survived by jumping out a second-floor window.

"She is doing as well as can be expected," said son Jason Mantas, a firefighter in Fort Collins.

Mantas was a fixture in Wheat Ridge, where he owned the pharmacy for 34 years.

"He was the most important person who ever lived here," said Don Eafanti, a former longtime city councilman. "He had the biggest heart in the whole world. When

people couldn't afford a prescription he'd give it to them. On Easter he had 50 turkeys and hams delivered to people," said Eafanti, who was Mantas' landlord. "I saw him give money to a woman who came in at Christmas time and said she couldn't afford Christmas or the prescription. I think it was close to \$300," said Eafanti.

"He loved the community and the people and the store," his son said. "He cared about the customers and spent time with them" when they had questions or didn't understand insurance forms.

"I think he viewed the pharmacy as his ministry," said Jason Mantas. "He never wanted to move and was a fierce defender of the independent pharmacist." Wheat Ridge Pharmacy was hit three times by armed robbers, Mantas' son said. Mantas once gave chase, but before he caught up, police officers happened by, joined the chase and caught the man.

A man once backed his car through the front of the pharmacy, said Eafanti, and another time they crashed through a wall in Eafanti's office, which adjoins the drugstore. Another time burglars got into the pharmacy through the ceiling, Eafanti said.

He and Jason Mantas said all the burglaries and robberies were for drugs, and after one burglary Mantas estimated the street value of the drugs at several thousand dollars, according to a Denver Post story.

Dennis Mantas was born in Chicago on Nov. 28, 1940, and was raised in East Chicago, Indiana.

He had polio when he was 7, "but fought his way back with exercises," his son said. "He never walked with a limp."

He earned a degree at Purdue University and worked in Munster, Ind., before moving to Colorado in 1975. He worked a short time at Wheat Ridge Pharmacy and then bought it.

He was president of RX Plus, an independent pharmacies' cooperative, and was former president of the College of Apothecaries.

Mantas worked six days a week and took few vacations, except for a trip to Greece and some three-day weekends. "He was always on call, even on Christmas," his son said. In addition to his wife and son he is survived by another son, Daniel Mantas of Hastings, Nebraska, and a daughter, Alexa Mantas of Arvada.

Dennis Mantas was a man dedicated to his family, profession and community. He died when a fire broke out in his Arvada home April 23. He was 68.

Mr. Mantas was known for connecting personally with his customers at Wheat Ridge Pharmacy, which he owned for more than 30 years.

"His employees were his second family," said Colleen Schell of Family Tree, who worked with him and the



pharmacy for 15 years. The City of Wheat Ridge awarded him the Reinvestment Award in

2007 for his volunteer work educating students about drug abuse and connecting with patients in nursing homes.

On a recent day, the pharmacy was packed with customers bringing flowers and condolences. Employees, who said they were swamped with work since the tragedy, declined to comment.

His impact reached beyond the walls of the pharmacy. He donated time and money to local charities, including Family Tree in Wheat Ridge, which supports victims of child abuse, domestic violence and homelessness. He partnered with Family Tree to deliver medications to Gemini, a residential treatment center for abused or runaway youth. Because of the delivery service, Gemini employees can spend more time working with youth, said Schell, who works with the program.

"I can't even begin to tell you how valuable that is," she said. The pharmacy and Family Tree initially built a partner-ship based on medical needs, but Schell said she started seeing him invest more time and funds for other Family Tree programs. "He started donating on a regular basis, and he would come to the celebrations," she said. "He'd always crack jokes with us when he'd come by." Amy Hickman, his neighbor, said several neighbors commemorated his generosity by starting a memorial fund in his honor. Donations can be made to the Memorial Fund of Dennis Mantas at any Wells Fargo, she said. His family will dedicate the funds to local charities. "It's really important for people to know all the good things he did," she said.

Diana (Diamando) Pastis Kanacopoulos, 96, left this life peacefully on March 19, 2009. Diana was born in Ikaria and immigrated to the United States as a young woman. She married the

late George

Kanacopoulos in 1939 and lovingly raised her family in the Washington, DC area where she remained a resident for 66 years. She is survived by her two daughters, Mary Kanacopoulos Speis of Rockville, MD, and Jackie Kouvdos of Athens, Greece, along



with her son-in-law Yannis and granddaughter Kelly. She is also survived by two of her 11 beloved brothers and sisters, Maria (Pastis) Aivaliotis of Verona, PA and Nicholas Pastis of East Setaucket, NY, and many nieces and nephews.

Diamando was a loving, nurturing woman, always putting others before herself. She will be deeply missed by so many. May her memory be eternal.

A GREEK LANGUAGE PROGRAM

This way the students will have the opportunity to practice the language more effectively and learn more about Greece and its people. The environment of Arethousa is ideal for concentration and study. The center's facilities include a small library, fast internet and wi-fi. Although the center's location is remote, the students have the opportunity to explore the island using a car which is provided by the center.

Going Global

An African Experience

Development has always been a side passion of mine, but somehow just about everything got in the way for me to pursue it on a more active level. Until one day, I decided to do something about it. Following the advice my parents always seemed to give me – to live my life and to fully enjoy it - and with my own addition of "why not?" I booked my ticket to Africa to volunteer with micro credit programs and women's groups.

Micro credit (or micro loans) is a proven method of breaking the cycle of poverty by providing small loans (approximately \$50 - \$2000), without collateral in return, to women in third world countries who can start or continue to run their businesses, which would provide them and their families a source of income. With this income, these women are empowered in a subservient culture. They can afford to



send their children to school, put food on the table, a roof over their heads, and access to clean water, electricity, and healthcare. Without money, children are pulled from school and forced to work to help support the family, at <u>any</u> age. Simply put, no food without money. Drinking unsanitary water is the only choice to prevent dehydration. There is no money to buy a simple aspirin or cough medicine, \$10 pills to cure malaria, and worse case, no money for HIV/AIDS testing and treatment. The poverty cycle continues and the chance for a better life for the next generation dwindles before their eyes.

Micro credit was developed in the 1970s by a now-Nobel Peace Prize winner Muhammad Yunus in Bangladesh, the creator of Grameen Bank and "banker to the poor". His programs have since spread worldwide throughout the developing world. Today, many micro finance institutions, non-government and non-profit organizations exist to support and to implement these programs that provide a self-sustainable way of life. Micro credit is a more widely available financial service to under-served, low-income clients who are too poor to borrow money from a bank, yet can establish a credit history and income necessary to eventually obtain commercial loans. Micro credit is simply a bridge which can eradicate poverty, one village at a time.

Micro loans are provided to women as women are historically more trusted with money and will first spend their profits to take care of the family. Women take the loans as individuals or as groups. As a group, each woman guarantees the other, so if she cannot make her weekly or monthly repayment, the women will gather their resources and help her. The worldwide default rate for micro loans is historically much lower than the loan default rate for industrialized countries – less than 1% is some countries, less than 2 or 3% in others. Aside from the fact that defaulting on a loan brings shame among the person or group, which can be

a great detriment to their reputation within the village, these women have no choice. They have to provide for their families because it is literally a matter of life or death.

Last year, I traveled to Ghana, West Africa, home to the Gold Coast and former slave trade. What I first realized is how my trips to Greece starting at a young age had prepped me for such an adventure.



Walking off the plane onto the tarmac into the airport; the unpaved, nameless roads; laid-back attitudes without rush; power outages; water conservation; never-before seen bugs; goats on the side of the road; and hot and steamy weather!

I stayed in a small village called Ho, in the Volta Region, and volunteered with an organization called Village Exchange Ghana. To supplement the micro credit program, they also provided business training and record-keeping to women so they can understand the very basics of running a business. The literacy rate here was between 50%-60% and the monthly average income was about \$50. The organiza-

tion also provided health education with funding assistance from the UN, and ran income-generating activities such as jewelry and dressmaking. These programs provide women the opportunities to learn a skill and to earn a wage. In Ghana, everyone was willing to learn and took advantage of every opportunity they had to enrich themselves as they knew it was a way for perhaps a better life. I spent my days interviewing women who were interested in starting a business, helping them on what and where to sell their items to gain the most selling opportunity (i.e. at the



market, or in a basket on their heads traveling from village to village), reviewing loan applications, advising on the amount they should receive and their payment

plans. We traveled to neighboring villages to talk to women's groups arranged by the tribal mothers of the village who had heard of the benefits of micro credit. We also checked up on the women who had individual micro loans and their businesses in town, which were successful in selling items such as homemade fish sauce, handbags, and batik cloth. Women are encouraged and feel empowered in situations where they are left to unexpectedly fend for themselves, widowed, or have too many children to care for. In poverty stricken areas, these women provide hope for themselves, their family, and encouraged economic growth between villages.

This year, I went to Arusha, Tanzania, in East Africa to volunteer with a grassroots foundation called EduCare. Tanzania blew me away. In a country so lush, vibrant, colorful, with peaceful living amongst both Christians and Muslims, full of wildlife and safari, Mt Kilimanjaro, and its indigenous native Maasai tribes, I felt as if at times I stepped into a National Geographic magazine. The little clothing children had was torn, and they were wearing the one pair of shoes they owned, even if split or without sole. Many homes had no running water or electricity, and are forced to boil water from hand-dug streams on the side of the roads for drinking purposes. There were villages with no schools. And many, many children who are left orphaned because their parents have passed or are not physically able to take care of them. People die from simply dehydration, bacteria in the water, to malaria and AIDS. Children die from AIDS, but the worst is that parents are reluctant to have their children tested because of the stigma attached. They are grateful for a bottle of clean water, which is luxury to them. A 1.5 litre of water can cost less than a dollar. Sure, this is cheap for us, but too expensive for them. In this area

of Tanzania, people live on less than a dollar a day. Houses are half-built, and because electricity is expensive at \$10 per month, charcoal and wood are preferred for cooking and lighting.

I spent every day with EduCare, trekking up dirt roads, meeting with women's groups, many of whom are involved with organic farming. Farming is a more reliable way of providing a meal on the table. They found that organic vegetables substantially improve their health, of which is now creating an increased demand locally and potentially a great source of income. The farms were originally for their own family use, but to maintain them requires an income. Advising them to portion a part of their farm for selling only had encouraged them to grow more vegetables and saw the opportunity to sell locally to the tourism industry of safari in Arusha just a few miles down the road. Money for



seeds, garden tools, and fencing is always in need, so they were encouraged to save as little as \$2 a month per woman in their group in order to reach a certain level, just enough for a woman to

borrow, buy supplies, sell crop, and pay back in a few months for another woman to borrow. Another method is to

have a group save money each month until they reach a certain level so they can buy seeds and tools for the next growing season. Simply opening a bank account provides them with ease that their



money would be safe. Recommending ideas such as putting up signs on the side of the road, relocating their kiosks to the busy end of the street, selling different items than their neighbors, or buying from cheaper suppliers can perhaps increase their selling opportunities and ease their weekly micro loan repayments. What seems to be everyday, simple solutions to us, results in *a world of opportunities for them*.

These non-government and non-profit organizations cannot perform their missions of helping those less fortunate without volunteers. Monetary donations are the easiest way to help and are always welcomed; however without the legwork and people on the ground implementing the programs, these organizations would be unsuccessful. By no means am I writing this for my own self-indulgence, but only to perhaps open more eyes and to encourage others to look just a bit beyond and find it in themselves to help those less fortunate, in any capacity, anywhere.

Since marrying an Icarian five years ago, British photographer Edward Webb has been creating images of the landscape and people of Ikaria. He is planning an exhibition there this summer. Ikaria offers the photographer the unexpected every day. If you go out to photograph a beach you will probably end up taking a portrait of a shep-

herd. If you search for interesting characters to appear in your portraits you will probably end up photographing a little known beach.

I take my camera with me wherever I go in Ikaria, and if I really want to capture the beauty of the island I make myself get up long before dawn, or stay out in the mountains while the sun sets and everyone else is settling down to ouzo and mezedes. I try to stay as far away from the car as possible and be prepared to stay out a long, long time, waiting for the sun to hit the rocks and sea from the best angle. I have walked with friends from sea level up ancient footpaths to the top of the mountains, carrying sixty pounds of camera equipment, and taken no pictures because the light was not right.

The changing light transforms the Aegean views hour by hour. The soft light of early morning or late evening allows the rocks to glow, and the topography to show off its shapes and curves. The midday sun often ruins a good view, but there are no rules.

Photography opens the mind to every subtle difference, so that you become immersed in the landscape, conscious



of the turning of the earth and the rising of the moon, and hyperaware of how thousands of generations have trod the paths before you.

In life, Ikaria rewards an open mind. By trying to repeat clichéd images of white churches against a blue sea, you will be frustrated – the Cyclades are far better for this. But by exploring all the complexities, ancient and modern, of this jewel of an island, you will end up with pictures that will tell the island's story to future generations.

The following is an excerpt from a special catalogue that was published for the United States Embassy in Athens.

Peter Calaboyias

As I began working in sculpture in the late 1950s, and 1970s, sculptors were being drawn towards the movements of abstract expressionism and monumental minimalism. This influence was manifested early in several of my site commissions, bronze and steel sculptures.

The development of my recent work lies in the recalling of the memories of early years of my life. I remember growing up in Europe and Africa during-the Second World War and recall images of broken and twisted metal of war machines; images of broken marble archaic Greeks sculptures; Ionic columns standing alone for millenniums; Cycladic plank idols; objects carved in ivory and ebony from the Congo; and the massive geometric forms of Egypt. There were also those monumental stone markers scattered throughout the Middle East and Europe embedded in the earth, frozen in time and still heralding the laws of despots and monarchs of ancient times. These images have found their way into my new works in the 'stele' series, the fragmented figures of archaic marbles, and mythological subjects captured in bronze sculptures and paintings. Like most artists, my

work develops with new experiences. This coming together of the early and current ideas influences the always evolving creation of new sculptures, paintings, drawings and prints.

Peter Calaboyias was born in Icaria, Greece. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Pennsylvania State

University. University Park, and a Master of Education degree from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He has completed additional studies at Carnegie-Mellon University, Pittsburgh, and University of Pittsburgh, both in Pennsylvania. The recipient of many commissions, he has participated in numerous exhibitions throughout the


